The Care and Feeding of Your Winch and Retriever

After using my Rahm winch and retriever for over a year I think it is time to share the ins and outs of my setup.

Your winch and retriever will only be as good as your batteries. At the present time my winch battery is a Delco Voyager Group 27 Sealed Marine Deep Cycle battery with 720 marine cranking amps and will carry a continuous 15 amp load for 5 hours. This battery will give you 80 to 100 launches when fully charged. Don't buy a smaller one!

The retriever battery is a 6 v RV/Marine Deep cycle capable of 6.5 hours of continuous use at 25 amp. This battery is a overkill, it will last through two of the 12v batteries on the winch. Don't buy a cheap 6v Volkswagon battery, it won't last. Plan on spending \$150 on both batteries if you want a reliable system.

Charging, I charge both batteries the minute I get home from the contest, with a Sears variable amp charger that goes to trickle charge when they are fully charged. I think this is extremely important to extend-

ing battery life. Don't leave them sitting in your garage all week at a discharged state and charge them up on Friday nite unless you like buying batteries. On Friday nite I trickle charge them all nite long which gives me maximum performance. My 12v doesn't need water added as it is sealed but the 6v does so keep it at the proper level with distilled water. Don't let the plates show—new battery time. CAUTION Batteries vent gas while charging. If you charge the batt. next to your winch, the toe line will get acid on it and you will experience line breaks till it is replaced. I cover both my winch and retriever with plastic bags to preserve the line.

What about line? I use 1/16" Nylon braided 195 lbs. test line. This will give you good performance for launching both contest and X-C ships. Consider 195lbs, test minimum. On the retriever it is 80lb, test nylon braided line minimum. Don't skimp on quality here either. Remember the system is only as good as its weakest link. One note about putting on both winch and retriever line, put on more than you are going to need and once you get the line on, run the winch out slowly with the retriever attached then bring it back using the retriever. This will put the new line on both the winch and retriever tight and will eliminate tangles. Within a

> couple of launches the line will tangle. Good line is expensive but is well worth it. I try to have fresh line on for both the Annual X-C and SC2 contests. Its always good to have fresh line on for a big contest. I also make sure it is used a few times prior to the contest to

make sure the line is on the drums properly. A note about replacement, you will start to experience line breaks at the turnaround area when the line gets old. Cutting out a large portion of this area at that time will extend line life for another month or so.

A word about swivels. Don't use the cheap 50¢ kind. Go to a tackle shop and buy ball bearing swivels. They are about 4-5\$ a piece but last a long time and will swivel under load. You will need three for a proper setup

(see diagram next page.)

So now you have your winch and retriever with new line and freshly charged batteries and off to the field you go. Setup your equipment and before securing the winch have someone launch softly to make sure it is not winding up on one side of the drum. Now secure it and launch again softly to double check. Now you can stand on it.

One final note about operating your setup. Half the battle is preparation and setting it up properly. Make sure there are no line twists between the winch and turnaround. This is particularly true if the line breaks and you run down and tie the ends together. Take the time to make sure you have not

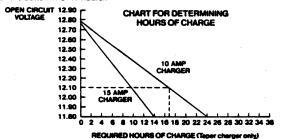

If an accurate voltmeter is available, the required time for recharging can be determined more closely. Depending on the actual battery state-of-charg this may be more or less than the minimum time determined from the built-in

IMPORTANT: Do not measure open circuit voltage right after recharging the battery. Surface charge may cause a false higher voltage reading. Measure only after battery has been standing with no electrical loads for 24 hours

Determine the hours of charging that will be required. Use an accurate volt-meter to measure the open circuit voltage, then use the chart below to determine how long to charge the battery.

EXAMPLE: If the open circuit voltage is 12.1 volts, find 12.1 volts on the left side of the chart. If a taper charger rated at 10 amps is used, go horizontally across the chart until the line for the 10-amp charger is reached (follow dotted line). From this point, read the required hours of charge directly below on the bottom line (17 hours).



The battery will be fully charged at the end of the time shown on the chart. The green ball should be visible in the built-in indicator. If not, tap the indicator lightly on top to dislodge any trapped air bubbles that might keep the ball from floating into view.

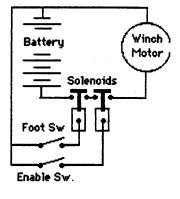
twisted the line or you'll have another break shortly. I have seen many times where a line is twisted on setup or after the line breaks and it just creates more problems. A word about knots. Learn to tie what is called a barrel or blood knot. Don't use any form of half hitches or bowline because they create a big knot and are weaker. The other half of the battle is the operator. Most likely you will learn the ins and outs of your equipment but the rest of the flyers at the field need to learn them as well. Give anyone operating it a little dual instruction so you can fly at ease. Make sure the operator knows what to do if a winch line or retriever line breaks or tangles or if the foot switch sticks on. Once it happens is not the time to figure out what to do.

When you are done for the day take the time to check out all you equipment and fix any problems so it is all ready to go next time. Also the key to not getting kinks in the line is to pull off 100 or so feet off the winch and retriever and have a helper hold the end, now start at the drum and slowly run the line between your thumb and forefinger. This will remove the twists in the line and if done properly the swivel will spin like a tornado. Do this two or three times and the next time you use your equipment there will not be a tendency for it to kink up. Happy launching and retrieving.

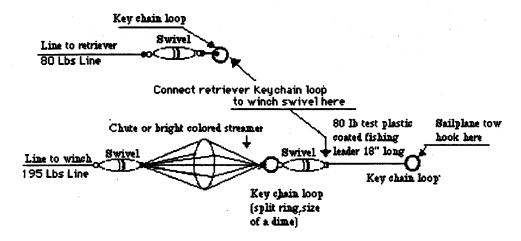

Safety Switch Setup S.W.S.A. Newsletter

AJ. Huber took the time to try and figure out the chicken scratches I made for him at the meeting and installed a second solenoid with a winchmaster "enable" switch hooked up to it. We felt that this was easier to implement than a knife switch and provides some added

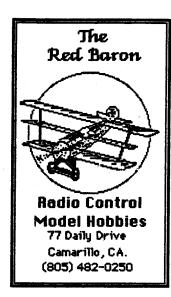

features.

The winch remains "dead" until the winchmaster closes his enable switch. This protects us from someone inadvertently stepping on the switch. or forgetting to get off of it after launch. If one of the solenoids sticks, there is another to break the circuit.

We tried it at the field and it seems to be O.K. The new switch is a hand held "normally open" that only has to be dropped to disable the winch. We will try it for a while, and if it works out we can retrofit out other winches.
