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### VISUAL PERCEPTION and LOST PLANES

I had the opportunity to speak with an expert in the field of human misual perception today named Greg Irvin. He mentioned something of immediate use to us. It seams that most humans have what is called "open field Myopia". In layman's terms, it means that when there is nothing to focus on in your field of view, your eyes tend to relax to a near field focus.

The effect of this phenomenon is that if you stare into the sky, with nothing to see, your eyes will drift to a focal point about five feet away! This means that if you speck-out, then lose sight of your plane on a clear day, even as you are trying to reacquire it, your eyes are losing focus. After 10 to 15 seconds, you could be looking straight at the plane and see nothing, because it is out of focus! If you have lost sight of your plane, you must focus on some structured object at a large distance ( such as the horizon or clouds) periodically as you search for it. The time it takes for your eyes to unfocus varies from person to person, but you can actually feel it happen if you pay attention.

Before you go for that next speck-out flight take a few minutes to experiment with your eyes and learn how best to use them, it might just save your plane. (Reprinted from the Torrey Pines Gulls Newsletter.)



### **Deadline for Comments Extended!**

The deadline for comments to the FCC has been extended from February 26 to May 28, 1993.

Almost everyone by now knows how the proposed FCC restructuring, PR Docket 92-235, stands to affect our frequencies by inserting two new frequencies between many of those frequencies presently assigned for modeling use and commercial users. The ruling, if passed, could cost RC modelers 31 out of 50 usable frequencies.

Many AMA members have already sent letters to their Congressmen voicing their concern and urging the lawmakers to intercede on behalf of modelers. Many copies of these well written letters have been sent to AMA headquarters.

With the extended deadline, there is more time to write to your representatives in Congress, but don't put it off! Remember, the most effective approach is a personal letter, written by you, voicing your opposition to the proposed rule.

An effective argument against the proposal could be the educational aspect of model aviation. Many modelers are involved in teaching a young person how to fly or giving demonstrations to school or youth organizations. This too stands to be adversely affected should the FCC proposition be passed. Although these young people are not necessarily flyers, they still have an interest in the sport and letters from these young people stressing the educational aspects of model flying are also effective tools to use in the fight against the proposed ruling.

One of the most important concerns of any modeler is the safety and liability aspect created by the proposal. One way to indicate your concern is to stress the increased possibility of accidents as well as the virtual impossibility of detecting and preventing radio interference from the new frequencies which are designated as mobile. Help make your representative(s) aware of the possible dangers to the public by citing the size of your plane, the speeds which it attains and the proximity of the public when you are flying.


Indicate the time and money you have invested in RC modeling, as well as the hours of pleasure derived from your participation in the hobby. Mention the pieces of radio equipment that you currently have and indicate the financial loss you would sustain should these frequencies be rendered unsafe to use. If your concern is loss of business to your hobby shop, stress this by indicating the percentage of your business that comes from RC.

Another point to touch upon is the contribution of model aviation to the advancement and development of the commercial aviation industry. Should this measure be passed, the remaining 19 usable channels would greatly reduce the ability to learn about and study aviation on a small scale.

When writing your letters, remember to mention the name of the proposed Rule Making: Federal Communications Commission PR Docket 92-235.

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### Tips on Technique

### Vinyl Trim

The next time you trim an aircraft, try using 2-mil vinyl that can be found at the sign makers in all kinds of colors, including neons. You might be able to find one that will give you the scrap from their sign contracts or sell it to you at a reasonable price. Be careful however, because if you have to buy it off the roll, it can get expensive. To apply the stuff, mix up 2 cups of water, a tablespoon of liquid dishwasher detergent and a tablespoon of denatured alcohol. Cut the trim, peel the backing off, dip it into the solution and "float" the vinyl in place. You'll have plenty of time to position it. After it's in place, blot it with a lint-free cloth and squeege out the excess fluid using a scrap piece of balsa sheeting. Let it dry or put your heat gun to it (not too close). End result is no bubbles! I've tried the vinyl over Coverite and Monokote with the same results. The stuff I'm using seems unaffected by glow-fuel. I tested it by sloshing 15% nitro over some samples last November and there is still no sign of it coming up. Be careful however, because not all products may have the same adheisive backing. Test it first.

### **Epoxy Hazard**

The Health and Safety Division of the 3-M company warns that hazardous iso-cyanate vapors are formed when epoxy paint is mixed with its catalyst and can cause severe respiratory damage. The injurious vapors are absorbed through the respiratory system and may cause a build up to the point of sensitization which can produce an allergic reaction. There is no antidote for this condition and modelers are warned to use appropriate ventilation and a special paint mask manufactured by the 3-M company. The #6986 mask can be purchased from an automotive paint supplier or #8709 from a safety products outlet. They are identical masks and have special impregnated chemicals that neutralize the harmful iso-cyanate vapors. The masks should be kept in a zip lock bag and stored in a sealed coffee can when not in use to retain the protective chemicals from evaporation. The cost of the masks range from \$8 to \$12, which is cheap considering the alternatives. The use of epoxy paint for the finishing of model airplanes is very popular since it is extremely durable, fuel proof, has high gloss, fast tack and is relatively easy to use. The major disadvantages of using epoxy are that it is heavy and can increase the finished weight of a model aircraft in addition to being injurious to your health.

### Magnetizing

Have you ever struggled dropping those little servo mounting screws into the servo lug holes to tighten them? This and similar jobs can be made a snap if you use a magnetized screw driver to hold these screws during positioning.

You can easily and permanently magnetize your screwdriver. Wrap between 30 and 100 turns of insulated wire around the shaft of your screwdriver. Wire can be vinyl or shellac coated and can be 18-28 gauge. Leave a comfortable length of wire on each end of this coil. Strip off an inch or two of insulation shellac from each end.

Fasten one end to one terminal of a 12 volt battery. Strike the other bare end across the other terminal of your battery. That's it. Your screwdriver is now permanently magnetized.

WARNING! This procedure causes a spark when striking across battery. Make sure that battery caps are in place and ensure that no flammable fumes are present before proceeding.

### Fiberglass Tape

From Bill Fitzgerald comes this building suggestion:

Over the years, I have been very dissatisfied with the various widths and weight of the fiberglass tape that I use to reinforce the center sections of the wing. Since the advent of the instant glues, the chore has been made easier, but it still seems like "overkill". While living in Dallas, I ran a number of tests on various materials and discovered a much better solution. You can usually find it in the hardware store in the drywall and plaster department. They sell a mesh fiberglass joint tape that works perfectly. It comes in 2" or 3 3/4" widths in rolls that are 25 to 75 feet long (in case you build a very wide wing!). The mesh has squares that are approximately 1/8" in size. Just cut to length and Zap it to the wing. Then lightly sand the edges and lightly buff the high ridges off and you're done. I've used this method on pattern ships, scale bipes, ducted fans, and fun fly ships. Even with a few violent crashes, the center section of the wing has held. There is one added bonus to this method. In some stores, they carry a self adhesive version of this tape and it works even better. After cutting it to length, just press it onto the wing and it stays put! This way it is much easier to hit it with the instant glue.
