So — How did HSS's Man on Man (SC)² round work out? Read on......

Tough day, the sky was orange from the smoke and ash of the on going fires in Riverside County. Many homes were lost and the fires are still not contained. We did get some east winds early on; they were strong enough to have us set the field in reverse. This was a slight pain and Karl jumped on the mover to clear some brush at the last minute so we had the room for all 12 winches and landing zones. The pilots meeting started a bit after 9:00 and with the extra work needed for the field that's not too bad.

We did have most of the 3F and a few Sportsmen decide not to fly because of the possibility of stronger winds a little later in the day. That is of course the CD's responsibility to bring the correct weather for everyone's liking. (The high winds never happened). To be fair if you live just 10 miles inland the winds in SA conditions get to 20+ mph, 30 miles inland and the SA's pump 40+ easily. We probably had 12 max at ground level straight up the lines but that passed rather quickly. Round 1 took a little time to get organized but as soon as the matrix was posted and everyone learned the system we were moving right along.

It was a Blood Bath! The air was VERY tough and a few world class pilots went on a feeding frenzy. This was NO LANDING contest I guarantee you! 10 minutes was hard, very hard most of the day. We got through round 1 and the winds changed 180 deg. back to normal, this is usually the trend with SA's at our field so with the help of the pilots we turned around 12 winches and re set the landing zone. On to round 2.

By now everyone went through the cycle once and knew how it works and we finished the next 2 rounds in good time. I think the last group landed just before 1:50. Ash covered everything in sight. The air was getting better all day and we saw more maxes in each slot. A lot of blood was left on the field, most of it mine! I don't think I made 17 minutes all together. I guess concentrating on flying does pay off.

Man on Man is a tough contest to run especially when the pilots are used to sitting around and flying 3 x then going home. With extra effort of the a lot of pilots we finished a darn good contest. Thanks again for the EXTRA effort, you know who you are and your hard work made today happen.



RES winners were David Judson, Dan Borer and Gene


